Ben is excited about the opportunity to work with

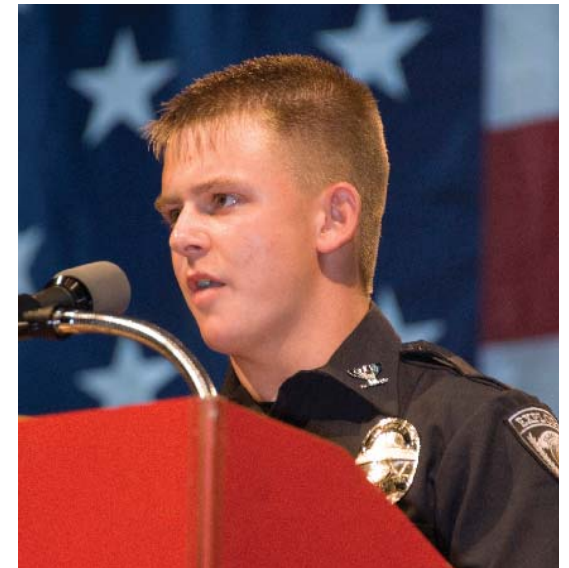

Cory Jackson wanted to follow-up his speech with a thought for his fellow Explorers.

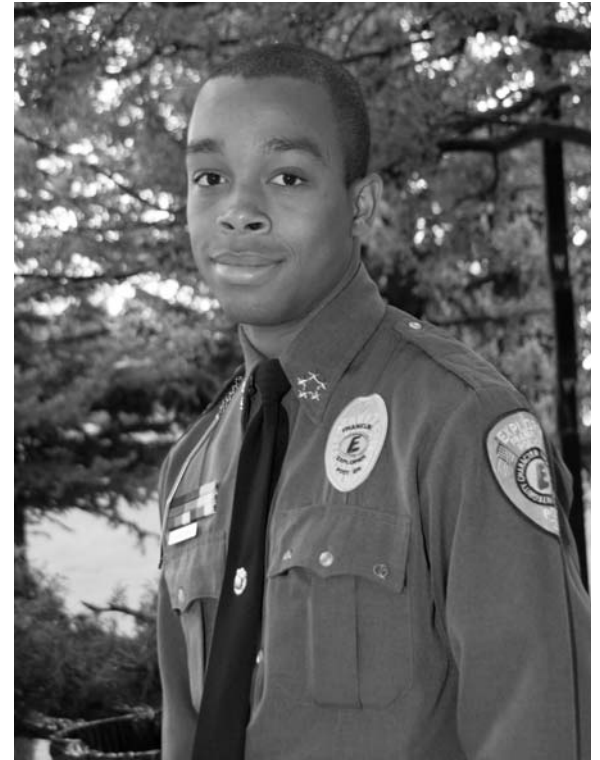
"I don't want people to think that I'm arrogant or cocky. I just speak with a lot of passion and conviction."

Have you ever wondered how you'll stay active in Law Enforcement Exploring once you graduate from high school? Most Explorers don't know that their Exploring careers don't have to end when they leave home to attend college. This is because most Explorers have never thought about joining or starting an Exploring program sponsored by their campus police department.

Campus Exploring allows students to have an opportunity to join or continue their Exploring program. Most colleges have thousands of students eligible to join a Law Enforcement Explorer post. When a campus Explorer works an event or does a ride along they have the opportunity to be seen by thousands of students that are potential Exploring recruits. College students are at a time in their lives when they are trying to figure out what type of career they want to pursue. One main principle behind Law Enforcement Exploring is to let young adults explore the possibility of a career in law enforcement. Another benefit is that some posts such as the ones at The University of Texas and Richland College at Dallas offer up to six hours of college credit towards their degree.

This is why we encourage motivated Explorers going off to college to contact their campus police departments and ask about setting up an Explorer program.

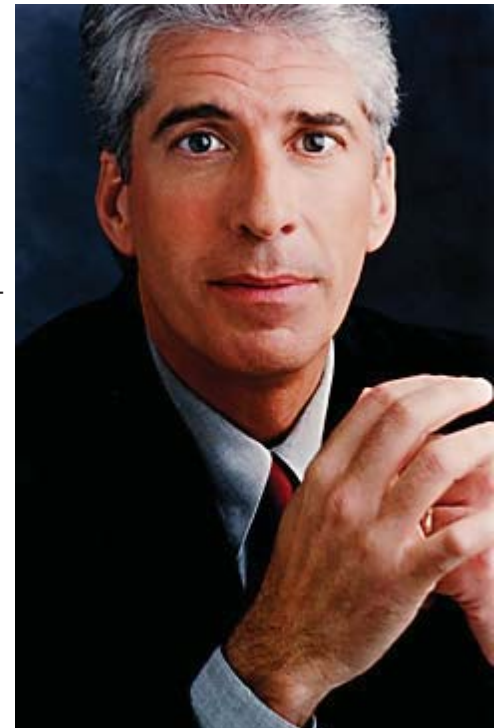

What You Need to Know....

RULES IN RESIDENCE HALLS

Northern Arizona University has set rules to insure the safety and comfort of participants staying in the residence halls. A few simple guidelines should cover them all: Secure your belongings, keep your area clean (since our conference is so large, NAU provided additional trash receptacles for your daily use) and keep resident traffic to a minimum. Remember any damage in assigned rooms is charged to your post. All posts were given a check sheet on arrival to check rooms and report any damage on arrival. If you do not have the form turned in to the dorm office you may be charged for damages.

Avoid Altitude Sickness: It Is Serious!

Many of the Explorers visiting “Health and Safety” are suffering from altitude sickness. The major presenting complaint is headaches, sore throat, nausea, and lethargy. The way to avoid these symptoms is to drink water as much as possible. Health and Safety want all Explorers, Advisors, and Staff to have fun, drink fluid and be SAFE!
